

#### **Research Objective**

To enrich the theological reflection of Spirituality of Ageing in Hong Kong as a process of Integral Human Development from an intercultural and interfaith approach.

#### **Research Questions**

- What is the Spirituality of Integral Human Development, and how may it be understood and interpreted in the HK's Ageing journey?
- How the intercultural and interfaith belief/practice enable the Spiritual journey of Ageing in HK?

#### Methods

- A qualitative inquiry with narrative analysis
- Focus on personal narrative, identity and self based on repertoire of stories and voices
- Semi-structured interview designed to cover relevant contents

#### 2020 - 2023 Progress

Stage 1: Design the conceptual framework and research

Stage 2: Commence the research fieldwork and analyse data for findings

Stage 3: Review and complete the final research

### Spirituality of Ageing

The existential constructs of spirituality and personal meaning in helping older adults to transcend old age and sustain wellbeing is important to help elders identify their individual sources of spirituality and empower them to provide meaningful interpretations of their lives.

Spirituality of Ageing towards End-of-Life

- Koenig (1988): spiritual factors increase near death
- McKinlay (2004): ultimate meaning of life, selftranscendence, intimacy with God & others, from fear to hope
- John Cottingham (2012): ageing is a process of "finding" identity in lifetime & full integration of whole self
- Gerard Hughes, S.J. (1999): Ignatian spirituality face the inevitability of death. Finding God in all things in fragility

### Catholic Social Teaching IHD: Relevance to End-of-Life

• Cardinal Turkson (Director of Dicastery Promoting IHD):

"At later life, we've experienced all things still longing for an integral life which can bring us spirit and joy in the process of progress, development and maturity"

Pope Francis:


"Elderly as "Bearers of memory" and "witnesses to the culture" of society"

 Human development integrates different dimensions: theological, spiritual, psychological, sociological, political, economic and ecological

Integral Human Development

- Holistic development of the human person, covering all aspects of life: social, economic, political, cultural, personal, and spiritual
- "Integral" is the key to the whole concept of IHD especially in appreciating the process of ageing & development in later stage of life

# Intercultural Dimension: IHD interpreted in Chinese cultural traditions

### "Integral" Chinese roots Etymological analysis

- Chinese translation of "Integral" 圓融: entrenched in ancient Chinese culture, Buddhism & Confucianism
- Yuan <a>E</a>: (round, circle) Buddhist: nature, water, fire, wind covering all
- Rong #: (dissolve, assimilated) interconnected, fully assimilated
- Yuanrong <u>JM</u>: fullness of Buddhism in letting all things go, fully interconnected & assimilated in nature

#### IHD concept Chinese translation 圓融生命發展

• Chinese concept implies an all-rounded way of selfactualization through a sound relationship with self, the others, the world and nature

 Full & harmonious fulfilment of life as individual, society and nature, integrated in personal & spiritual ways of living

Reconcile & transcend contradictions and conflicts

### "Yuanrong": commonly used in Chinese traditions

Confucianism, Buddhism, Daoism interacting & connecting one another

• "Yuanrong": commonly used interchangeably in Confucianism, Buddhism, Daoism, esp. Song and Ming Dynasties between 11<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> century

 Confucianism absorbed important elements from Daoism and Buddhism developing "Neo-Confucianism"

### Spiritual interpretation of "Integral" in Confucianism

 Confucian Scholar Tu Weiming: advocate "Spiritual humanism" in Confucianism to describe spiritual dimension of Confucian humanism

 Integrated vision for humanity in 21th C: self, community, nature, heaven

 Spiritual humanism: fruitful interaction of self & community, sustainable harmonious relationship of human species & nature, mutuality between human heart & way of heaven

# Ageing to End-of-Life: transcend suffering and struggle

 Reality of disequilibrium, productivity, human nature....the neglected, marginalized

• IHD & Yuanrong: connecting positive & negative experiences of life like struggle, pain, suffering, despair in life

• Discover hope when connecting with God, heaven, humanity......

#### Spiritual Strength to Wholeness

Transcend through Spirituality of IHD & Yuanrong

 Christianity: connect self, reconcile past, return to the Creator & respond to divine calling

 Confucianism: Spiritual Humanism, humanity and heaven

• Buddhism: letting go, compassion of self & others

# Significance of Intercultural dimension of IHD

• IHD & Yuanrong: reveal ultimate meaning in life stories, conflicts, tensions, relationship with self, others, God, heaven

• Empowerment from intercultural Spiritual dimension

 Insights to develop an Integral & holistic Ageing in later life

### Summary

 Spirituality of Ageing towards End-of-Life in relation to Catholic teaching of IHD

 Intercultural richness - IHD from the West be enriched and interpreted in Chinese culture & lens of Confucianism, Buddhism & Daoism
