






4	Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease	3,170,429
5	Trachea, bronchus, lung cancers	1,694,623
6	Diabetes mellitus	1,585,530
7	Alzheimer disease and other dementias	1,541,880
8	Diarrheal diseases	1,388,629
9	Tuberculosis	1,373,159
10	Road injury	1,342,265

64% of countries no or limited PC delivery; only 15% good integration



Worldwide need for palliative care by age group (2017)



Worldwide need for palliative care for adults by disease groups (20+ years 2017)



Worldwide need for palliative care for children by disease groups (0-19 years; 2017)





Worldwide need for palliative care for adults by World Bank income category (20+ years; 2017)



Over 75% of need is in LMICs

Only ~30% of services in LMICs

7 million receiving PC – only 12% of need for PC met - from 25,000 PC services



Up from 16,000 services caring for 3 million patients in 2011

- 90 responses
- 40 countries








Over ¾ have mod-severe disruption

Q5 To what extent has COVID-19 disrupted the delivery of essential palliative care services to adults and children with pre-existing palliative care needs in your country (e.g. Not COVID19 patients)



Key Findings

- ACCESS TO PALLIATIVE CARE
- Palliative care services for adults and children with pre-existing palliative care needs are being disrupted
- People with COVID-19 are not getting the palliative care they need
- Vulnerable groups, including migrants and refugees, may be particularly at risk of not accessing palliative care.

Key Findings

- Government Integration
- Governments are not integrating palliative care into the COVID-19 response
- Most governments are not financing palliative care as part of their COVID-19 response
- Financial Sustainability of PC
- Most palliative care organisations are concerned about their financial sustainability

Key Findings

- Universal Health Coverage and PC
- Only half of respondents reported that palliative care was part of their country's Universal Health Coverage scheme
- Partnerships for PC
- Organisations whose primary focus is not palliative care (e.g. older people groups, health care professionals' organisations) have been supporting the integration of palliative care in the response

COVID-19 Dual Edged Sword

- PC Units Closed
- PC Professionals reassigned to COVID work
- Funding for PC diverted
- Huge rise in complicated bereavement

BUT

- PC most requested specialty/consult
- Value of PC seen and rising
- PC included in UN/WHO policies on COVID & health emergencies
- Bi-directional learning

COVID Impact on Bereavement

- Restrictions on
 - Visitation (no involvement in caregiving, social distancing)
 - Communication (saying goodbye, unfinished business, meaningful interation)
 - Preparation of the body for burial
 - Inability to hold funerals/memorials
 - Ability to see counselors/therapists
- Ambivalence about virtual communication



Policy Recommendations

- National strategies for bereaved citizens including:
 - Primary, secondary, and tertiary education and support
 - Primary education campaign for public about grief (national day, media awareness resource sharing)
 - Secondary support for the bereaved including
 - Social support, group support, individual counseling
 - Tertiary support for prolonged grief disorder, humanitarian emergencies & disasters
 - Compassionate Communities
 - Workplace support
 - Flexible leave policies, education programs for employees
 - Community engagement and involvement in support for bereaved
 - Increased access to hospice and palliative care programs/services
